Challenge: Foundation Paper Piecing

Try a new technique, or add to the skills you already have, with Foundation Paper Piecing.

What Is FPP?

Foundation Paper Piecing (FPP) is a quilting technique where a printed paper template guides fabric placement and stitching to create precise quilt blocks. The fabric is sewn onto the paper, and the paper is removed after the block is completed.

The criteria is simple.

Use whatever combination of colors and pattern(s) you like.

Size: at least 24 inches Square

Must be made using foundation paper piecing technique. Finished guilts must be submitted at the December TRPQG meeting.

2025 Mystery Quilt Clue 7

See below step 5, was incorrect when previously communicated as combine 1 color B square and should be combine 1 C square

Cutting:

- From the background fabric, cut 2 squares 7 x 7 inch. Cut each square diagonally into two triangles.
- o From the background fabric, cut 6 squares 4 x 4 inch.
- o From Color C, cut 8 squares 3.5 x 3.5 inch.
- From Color D, cut 2 squares 5 ¼ x 5 ¼ inch. Cut each square diagonally into two triangles.
- o From Color D, cut 6 squares 4 x 4 inch and 4 squares 3.5 x 3.5 inch.

Keep leftover fabric – you may need it later!

Piecing:

Step 1. Find ziplock bag marked Clue 3 and pick one block. Put aside the rest of Clue 3 bag. Take 2 triangles cut from 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ inch square. Mark the middle of the longest side of each triangle, center the triangle, pin carefully without stretching the bias side of the triangle. Sew on the opposite sides of the Clue 3 block. Press the seam allowance towards the triangle. Repeat with the remaining two triangles cut from the 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ squares. Trim the resulting square to 9 x 9 inch square.



Step 2. Take 2 triangles cut from the 7 inch background square. Mark the middle of the longest side of each triangle, center the triangle, pin carefully without stretching the bias side of the triangle. Sew on the opposite sides of the 9 x 9 inch square block. Press the seam allowance towards the triangle. Repeat with the remaining two triangles cut from the 7 square. Trim the resulting square to $12 \frac{1}{2} \times 12 \frac{1}{2}$ inch square.

Step 3. Mark a light pencil diagonal line on the wrong side of the background squares. Pair one background and one color D square, right sides together. Pin. Sew a scant ¼ inch seam on either side of the marked line. Cut on the pencil line to make 2 Half-Square Triangles. Press the seam allowance towards the darker fabric. Trim to 3.5 inch square as needed. Make 12 HSTs.



Step 4. Combine 1 color D square (3.5 x 3.5 inch) and 3 HSTs to make the "Fish" block. Make 4 blocks with Color D.

Step 5. Find the ziploc bag marked Clue 4. Combine 1 color C square and 3 HSTs from Clue 4 to make the "Fish" block. Make 8 blocks with Color C.

FISH block



Mark the resulting blocks as Clue 7 and set aside.

Book Review

Hope's Journey: Classic Blocks, Reproduction Quilts, and Stories of Bygone Days

By Betsy Chutchian

Hope's Journey by Betsy Chutchian is the book I am reviewing for this month. Ms. Chutchian says Hope is the name of every woman who had to leave her home with her husband to travel west in hope of a better life. While pioneer women did not know what was ahead, you will know as you make these quilts because you have the book with the pattern telling you where you are going! You do have choices with your fabrics and various ways to piece the blocks together but you know the destination. The blocks are small so they lend themselves to use leftover fabric from larger projects. These small projects may be hung on the wall or placed around a room on the back of a chair.

Chick, Chick, Chick, Hen is only 15 ½" square. The border is composed of many half square triangles that are stitched together. Because this quilt is not designed for a bedcover, the author suggests using a single-fold binding.

Birdshot is another really small quilt. Since many of us have already made more quilts than we can use, this pattern lets you have the fun of making a quilt without investing in a huge amount of fabric or time. The quilt is $10 \frac{1}{2}$ x $14 \frac{1}{2}$.

without investing in a huge amount of fabric or time. The quilt is 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 14 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". You are using 3 x 3" squares that are divided into light and dark. These small quilts are also perfect for trying out various free motion quilting designs.

With each design, Ms. Chutchian gives you the history of one of the pioneers. These stories are derived from the journals that many of the women kept along their journeys. One lady and her husband brought 500 pounds of flour with them. She had an abundance. 200 pounds was the recommended amount. She also brought canned peaches, dried fruit, bacon, ham, opera glasses, and two folding upholstered chairs. She had enough to trade with the Native Americans she encountered along the way. She traveled along the Bozeman Trail during the time a peace treaty was in effect.

There are many stories in the book about the pioneers themselves. One young girl traveled west in 1850 with her parents and six siblings. They were attacked and all were killed except this girl, one brother, and one sister. The girls were taken as captives by a tribe of Indians and became their slaves. After a year they were traded to the Mohave Indians. They were well treated by the Mohave Indians. The US Army found them after five years and reunited the sisters with their brother. A book was written about their ordeal.

This book is entertaining to read, as well as giving you some quilt designs to try in a small scale.


