

Book Review

Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement

Suzi Parron set out to document the American Quilt Trail Movement. She planned to spend six months researching barn quilts. She was in Cadiz, Kentucky when she saw the first barn quilt. She was planning to camp out about thirty miles beyond the spot where she saw the first barn quilt. She drove on to her campsite, about thirty miles away. The next day she drove back to the place where she had seen the quilt painted on a barn. No one she questioned along the way knew why the barn had a quilt painted on it but everyone said they thought it was really pretty. Ms. Parron drove to the barn where she saw her first quilt block and asked the lady of the house to tell her about the barn. The lady told her that someone thought that putting quilt squares on barns would celebrate a woman's role on the farm. As Ms. Parron drove further on route 91 she saw more and more quilts. The blocks were painted in bright contrasting colors so that they were easily visible from the road.




Ms. Parron was given a lady's name at the Kentucky Arts Council. That person told Ms. Parron that Donna Sue Groves had created the first barn quilt and that she should tell the story. She gave Ms. Parron Donna Sue's phone number. Donna Sue was originally from West Virginia. Donna Sue's mother started a game for her children of counting barns while driving to visit their grandparents in Ohio. Some barns were worth two points; others were worth more in their game. The children and their mother discussed the barns they passed along the way. When they got to the Pennsylvania Turnpike, they spotted the Pennsylvania Dutch barns with hex signs on them. They were worth fifty points in their car game. The game was always in Donna Sue's mind as she got older.

Donna Sue's grandmother quilted. She had Donna Sue select her three favorite maple leaves one fall. She didn't tell Donna Sue what she planned to do with the leaves. At Christmas, her grandmother gave Donna Sue a quilt with maple leaves in the blocks. Donna Sue was fascinated with her quilt. Her family moved from West Virginia to Xenia, Ohio. After her father died, she and her mother bought a farm with a small barn on it. The barn was ugly, in Donna Sue's opinion, but she thought color would help. She decided to paint a quilt square on it. Years passed before she got it done. She and her friends decided it would be fun to paint multiple blocks on barns and encourage folks to take a driving tour of their county in hopes of inspiring tourism. She was also hoping to help the local artists. She formed a committee to plan the trail. Her mother was a quilter and quilt historian. She was elected to select the blocks that would be used. They decided to start with twenty blocks, a typical number of blocks in a bed quilt. Her mother made a sampler quilt using the twenty blocks she had selected. Those who wanted to paint blocks on their barns came to the Groves house to select their block. Local artists painted the blocks for the barns. Adams County started with twenty blocks. There are far more now. The trail has spread across thirty states and there are more than three thousand painted quilt squares across the country along with a sampler of the original twenty quilt blocks in Ontario, Canada.

An unexpected outcome has been with the involvement of young people. Seventy youth groups in Iowa have been involved in painting the squares. This book is a fascinating history of quilt trails across the country.

There are several quilt trails in counties around Nash County. We had a speaker talk to the guild about painting the squares. I would love to see one on our quilt guild building. To my knowledge there are no squares actually in our county. It would be wonderful if we could start the trail with the first block. I am willing to contribute toward having it done. Are you?

Try a new technique, or add to the skills you already have - when creating a log cabin quilt.

What Is a Log Cabin?

A block created with strips of fabric sewn around a core shape.



The criteria is simple

Use whatever combination of colors and pattern(s) you like.

Size: at least 48 inches Square

Must be made using traditional or variations of the Log Cabin Block.

Finished quilts must be submitted at the June 2026 TRPQG meeting.

~Strawberry Palmiers ~ February 2026

Level: Easy Time: 35 minutes Yield: 24 Palmiers

Ingredients:

2 sheets of Puff Pastry, thawed but still cold
18oz Strawberry Jam
Red Decorating Sugar



Directions:

1. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper & set aside.
>Preheat oven to 400°.
2. Unfold one of the thawed pastry sheets onto a sheet of freezer paper;
>Gently roll into a 13-inch square;
>Spread each pastry sheet with strawberry jam.
3. Roll the opposite sides of the pastry sheet toward the center of the square, so they meet in the middle.
4. Slice the rolled pastry into 1" thick slices;
>Arrange the slices on the prepared baking sheets, about 2" apart;
>Carefully pinch & mold the slices into a heart-shape;
>Sprinkled with Red Decorating Sugar.
5. Bake 1 pan at a time, at 400°, until golden, 6-8 minutes per side;
>Let cool.
6. While the first batch is baking, repeat Steps 2-5, with the second pastry sheet.





Listed below are cutting instructions for making a 24" or 36" block.


Step-1: Cutting instructions

	A	B	C
24" BLOCK	(6) 4" x 4"	(12) 4" x 4"	(18) 4" x 4" (12) 3.5" x 3.5" (4) 6.5" x 6.5"
36" BLOCK	(6) 5.5" x 5.5"	(12) 5.5" x 5.5"	(18) 5.5" x 5.5" (12) 5" x 5" (4) 9.5" x 9.5"


Step-2: Make half square triangles using your desired method with the 4" squares for the 24" blocks & the 5.5" squares for the 36" blocks.




Step-3: Sew together an A/C half square triangle (HST) & Fabric C square.



Step-4: Piece together (2) A/C HSTs.



Step-5: Sew together the shapes from the previous two steps & make number indicated.



Step-5: Sew together all the pieces to complete the block ~ DONE!!!
